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NEW NATIONAL TOUR OF ANNIE TO OPEN!

As <u>Annie People</u> begins its fourth year of publication, we are happy to report that there will be a new national tour of <u>Annie</u> in 1986, beginning in January in Rochester, New York. The tour is produced by Rochester Theatrical Productions, Inc. and will be co-sponsored by the Muscular Dystrophy Association. The tentative schedule indicates that the tour will run through the eastern United States and Canada in the early part of the year, and then go to the West Coast later on. More accurate schedule information will be published in AP as it becomes available, so that you can be sure to catch the latest <u>Annie</u> national tour when it comes to your area.

Annie will be played by 12-year-old Sarah Bethany Reynolds, who played the title role in 1984 in a regional production of Annie in Rochester and just finished up a run on Broadway as Louise in Sunday in the Park with George. From Sarah's regional Annie cast is Robert Tiffany, who will reprise his role of "Daddy" Warbucks opposite Sarah. Miss Hannigan will be played by Teri Gibson, who appeared on Broadway in Marlowe. And Annie National Tour veteran Moose will be back on tour once again as Sandy.

I've just read with some interest--and a keen sense of disappointment--the second part of Annie People's interview with Robert Fitch, our original Roos-It's a shame that so many vivid and permanent memories seem to be characterized as haphazardly as Robert chooses to characterize them--as well as the underlying all-abiding faith and belief that Charles and Tom and I merged with the vision and determination that was necessary to make it the milestone that it was-always was. Were we there, Bob? Who fueled all the enginestechnical, material, emotional, spiritual, practical, familial -- who drive the huge float that the musical was--who steered it? I reject out of hand that "we didn't know what to expect" in Washington and New York. I always knew what to expect. That was why I spent seven years of my life pre-Broadway and now ten years post-April 1977 -- emotionally, financially, and permanently attached to the core of the piece. There were some "mistakes," Bob, and an occasional "late decision" was made -- but I think you were the one who thought it was impossible. You say "perhaps" the creators and producers could see its potential clearly. "Perhaps" wasn't in the vocabulary of the director of Annie. "Why not" or "What if" or "Let's try" or "Cut this" or "Go left" or "Think" or "Stop acting" or "Be real" or "Shut up and just do it" was. Shows that are mammoth hits do not occur as Bob implies because tarot cards fall the right way, or forces conspire mysteriously and miraculously overnight to smile on your show. It's hard work. But very carefully thought-out work, consistently changing and shifting as the process goes on, and I have more than a vague recollection of being the tiredest but happiest kid on the block.



Lots of news on SARAH JESSICA PARKER, thanks to a new update from her mom. 1985 Sarah has starred in a feature film (Girls Just Want to Have Fun), an ABC-TV Movie of the Week (Go for the Gold, and a play in Los Angeles (Tiger Is Wild). She also filmed an episode of Hotel for ABC to be aired soon and is now working on location in Florida on a new film called The Navigator....The Young People's Showcase was recently at the Paper Moon club in downtown NYC. Performing in November were MELISSA KALFA, SUSAN LIPTON, CAROL-ANN PLANTE, and TANI TAYLOR POWERS. Since the long-running Youngstars showcase is now no longer in existence (The Something Different club in NYC closed last fall), several of those performers came down to the Paper Moon, including LARA BERK and her sister Melissa, and KIMBERLY STERN. 11-year-old Kim, who was in the tail end of the 4th National and in the 1984 National Tour, brought AP up to date on her latest activities: She was in an ABC-TV Special called Jeeter Mason and the Magic Headset and will be seen in a feature movie, Starlight, to be released this spring. She also starred in the part of Sarah in a traveling show called Peppermint Bear....TIM CURRY stars as The Butler in the current movie Clue. The movie is very funny and Tim is terrific. Don't miss it!.... MOLLY RINGWALD will star in an upcoming episode of Shelley Duval's Tall Tales and Legends, a new series on Showtime....ALLISON SMITH rode the Cabbage Patch Kids float in Macy's Parade during the rainlest Thanksgiving Day in recent memory. Allison also was featured in a benefit for missing children in December in which she sang "Never Go With a Stranger." Her singing voice becomes better every year and the song (she wrote the lyrics) is wonderful. It was . very well received at the benefit, and perhaps more radio stations will be playing it now. Also, watch this winter for a special episode of Kate and Allie which will feature Allison-Jennie persuades her mom to let her take a job at a croissant shop. I was at the taping and it was one of Allison's best so far....The premiere of Jerry's Girls on Broadway was delayed a few days because DOROTHY LOUDON broke her foot on a treadmill during one of the previews and was laid up for awhile. Does that mishap of Dorothy's sound familiar?.... 15-year-old MARISA MORELL, Annie in the 2nd National, was Dorothy in The Wizard of Oz at the Westbury Music Fair in New York. That makes four former Annies who have played Dorothy in the past year or so--Marisa, SHELLEY BRUCE, AILEEN QUINN, and ANDREA McARDLE. CRISTINA CONOMOS was a Munchkin at Westbury again this year, and she recently played the starring role in the IBM Holiday Show in Kingston, NY....It has been a busy season for the VINE family. STEPH-ANIE VINE and her mom PENNY LARSEN recently participated in a staged reading of The House in the Woods, a brand-new musical project in New York produced by Musical Theatre Works. Also in the reading were JANE CONNELL (Miss Hannigan in the 1st National with KATHY-JO KELLY) and SHERRI LEIDY. Stephanie's sister LIZ LARSEN is playing the lead in Hamelin, currently doing very well in an Off-Broadway run....Tammy Saphiloff has sent a clipping of 15-year-old MERE-DITH SALENGER, who is starring in the new Walt Disney film, The Journey of Natty Gann. The article states that Meredith was an Orphan extra in the Annie movie. Can anyone out there tell us which one Meredith was and where she appeared in the movie?....KIMI PARKS will be in the movie Heartburn, starring Meryl Streep and Jack Nicholson, which will be coming out in the summer GARRISON TRUE, who was hired by RAY STARK to conduct the search for the movie Annie during 1980, is out on the road again, this time looking for the girl who will play the lead in Pippi Longstocking. Part III - Conclusion

- AP: Was anything special done to keep the whole show "fresh" during the run?
- RF: Theoretically, we had clean-up rehearsals that presumed to help that. In some instances it did. Mostly they were changes in "bits"—additions to the show. Even "threat" and "chastising" sessions, and replacements helped give the show a revitalization. For instance, the second Lily was a completely different kind of person altogether, so my relationship with her was totally different. Therefore, my choices changed. That was refreshing to me. The mistake, however, was the "Saturday Massacre" (in Jan. 1980) when twenty of us were "let go" for just this purported reason.
- AP: What was your favorite part of the show?
- RF: My favorite parts were connected with the original performers. Like Ed Bordo's (Drake) little leap and how he got laughs from reading that no one else did. Barbara Irwin's (Lily) ditsey look and high pitched voice. Dick Ensslen's wonderfully human way with any role. Ray Thorne's (FDR) direct-economical way with voice, props and wheelchair, and compassion. Reid Shelton's indefatigable energy (Warbucks). Sandy's solo cross. Dorothy Loudon's double-takes (Miss Hannigan). Sandy Faison's (Grace) absolutely "period" treatment of her role. Egotistical Bert Healy. For me, the "Easy Street" number and the disguise to fool the audience.
- AP: Did you get to keep any props, costume, et cetera, when you left the show?
- RF: My moustache and a derby hat which I'd worn at one point (before it became a longshoreman's cap, then a felt fedora). Also the dance boots, which laced up like old-fashioned high-tops. Also my steps and my tricks.
- AP: What was your reaction when you heard the show was closing? Were you at the final performance on January 2, 1983?
- RF: I was sorry to see it close. I thought it could have stayed open longer had it not been bounced around the various N.Y. theaters. It was, after all, the "musical of the decade" as Hello, Dolly had been in the Sixties. No, I was not at the final performance; I was in Patent Leather Shoes in Philadelphia at the time.
- AP: What did you think of the Annie movie?
- RF: I will perhaps offend all of your readers here—it made me ill. It was cloying, distasteful, badly thought out, and structured weakly. It killed any real emotion between Annie and Warbucks. Its obvious attempts to get away from the Broadway production with broad movie techniques destroyed the heart of the story. "Hard-Knock Life" became a joke and a lie. "Easy Street" became a celebration and not a pivotal plot moment. The 4th of July depersonalized the sharing of love between characters. Hannigan's sexploits and the camera crotch shots were banal and non-period. There was no reality to the movie; therefore, no believability in the characters' struggle. There was no way to have any real feelings for the leads nor to root for Annie's efforts. They made the movie a tribute to '30s movie musicals, Radio City, and Garbo and attempted to make Annie the reincarnation of Shirley Temple—all smiley and cute—no hard times

for this kid. '30s musicals were all about lifting people's spirits out of the Depression. Annie is about a tough kid-fighting hard to make it. The result of the play is joy and realization. If they're so happy throughout, why do they need us? Punjab was not fully utilized in an imaginative way—the idea was merely attached to what already existed. It seemed irrelevant. At any rate, movies have the ability to elevate—but splash and bigness is not the answer—closeness and intimacy is the other possibility that movies can achieve. They should have with Annie.

- AP: If Annie ever comes back for a revival, would you like to play Rooster?
- RF: Well, it could be fun to do it again. One always gains from time, and it's a good way to measure that growth. But not just to do it--only if there was a good cast doing it. People tend to think Annie is a fool-proof show to perform. It is not:
- AP: You directed a tour of Annie in 1983 with Alyson Kirk. How did you find directing the show after acting in it for so long?
- RF: I directed three packages of Annie--the third in Boston and the second in Washington state. Alyson Kirk's was the second package to be professionally produced in summer stock in both proscenium and in the round. I loved it—the entire job of casting, planning, consulting in costumers, sets, tech rehearsals, and coaching the actors. I also loved the show—it is very special to me, and I attempted to do it as honestly as I could, to make it as pure as when it first opened. It vindicated my faith in it and in my own ideas about what was appropriate. But even this is a compromise, because the actors have to work well together, and that is the most important factor. There must be joy. Otherwise why do it? Anyway, all three were marvelous successes. I was exhausted, but very happily so.
- AP: What have been some of the other things you have done since Annie?

- AP: Thanks for sharing your memories with us. Best of luck with your career!
- RF: Thanks for asking—if you have other questions please ask. As you can see, I am pretty straightforward. I think your questions were very perceptive. I did think twice about answering some of them. But feelings are what I work with and this is the business I love. It's like religion—keep it honest and pure and the faith will come. So I answered as honestly as I could. My best wishes to you!
