





ANNIE RECEIVES ROYAL, SCHOLARLY TREATMENT SHE DESERVES AT GOVERNORS STATE UNIVERSITY

On November 13, 1997, "Annie, a History and Analysis of a Media Creation" was presented at Governors State University, University Park, Illinois, by Director-Singer-Actress-Writer Karen Piejko (pe-AY-ko), who is a graduate student in the Media Communications division at Governors State University. Piejko's thesis/project consisted of a 500-page, 29-chapter history of Little Orphan Annie, the live performance of an original 45-minute musical play, Leapin' Lizards! What's It All About?" which chronicled the life of Little Orphan Annie, and an extensive exhibit of Little Orphan Annie memorabilia, with never-before-seen items, many of which were on loan from actress Alene Robertson, an original star of Annie Warbucks.

The written portion was 500 pages of Annie history that included a critical analysis and comprehensive study of every communications medium that Annie has ever appeared in. Highlights included the social significance of the comic strip and a comparison/contrast of Harold Gray's social and political ideals that were carried over from the comic strip to the 1982 film *Annie* and the plays *Annie* and *Annie Warbucks*.

The written thesis includes chapters on the comic strip, the radio program, the 1932 film, the 1938 film, the 1976 musical at the Goodspeed Opera House, the 1977 Broadway musical, the 1977 original cast recording, the 1982 motion picture, the 1982 motion picture soundtrack, Aileen Quinn's rare "Tomorrow" 45 rpm record, the LP Feeling Good with Annie, the LP The Empire Brass Quintet Plays Annie, the LP Annie's Christmas, the LP Annie and the Mystery of the Vanishing Locket, the LP Annie: The Movie Narration, the musical Annie 2: Miss Hannigan's Revenge, the musical workshop Annie 2, the premiere of Annie Warbucks at Marriott's Lincolnshire Theatre, the Annie Warbucks tour, the off-Broadway Annie Warbucks in New York, the original cast recording of Annie Warbucks, the TV movie Annie: A Royal Adventure, the 20th Anniversary production at the Goodspeed, the 20th Anniversary Broadway production, the upcoming animated TV series Little Orphan Annie, Annie in fiction and non-fiction literature, Annie laserdiscs, Annie videotapes, Annie parodies, Annie on the Internet, and a host of other topics, too numerous to mention.

The highlight of the project was the critically acclaimed live performance of Leapin' Lizards! What's It All About? The original musical play starred Karen Piejko as Annie, Commissioner Doyle, Miss Hannigan, Mrs. Patterson, and as the voice of Sandy. Through song, dance, and dialogue, each character discussed the importance of the media Annie has appeared in. John "Hollywood" DeYoung, a WJOL-AM radio personality, assumed the duty of narrator between scenes, while Piejko frantically switched costumes, props, and set pieces. Highlights included a satire of the ill-fated Annie 2: Miss Hannigan's Revenge and a parody of the radio show, where instead of Ovaltine, the GSU professors saw photos of themselves plastered on cute, dorky products such as Segal Suds and Perkins Pickles!

Leapin' Lizards! What's It All About?" featured carefully crafted musical vignettes that explained the comic strip, the radio show, the films, the plays, and the future of Annie including the upcoming cartoon and Annie's permanent home on the World Wide Web. There wasn't enough time to fully orchestrate the many original songs and parodies; therefore, Piejko decided to do it a capella. Piejko's acting and musical performance was praised by critic Denise Graham Zahn of *The Innovator*, who said, "Anyone who can sing a capella and stay on key impresses me!"

Naturally, the performance was highlighted by a few bars of Martin Charnin and Charles Strouse's "Tomorrow" from the *Annie* play, in addition to a few bars of "Love," "Changes," and "Above the Law," which were all showstoppers from *Annie Warbucks*. Piejko energetically switched back and forth accurately imitating the voices of Lauren Gaffney, Andrea McArdle, Aileen Quinn, Shirley Bell, Carol Burnett, and Alene Robertson.

Finally, the exhibit, which served as the background for the play, consisted of Annie mugs, rag dolls, local and national play photographs, autographed pictures, sheet music, the original script from the historic White House performance of Annie Warbucks, Annie lockets, press clippings, color and black and white photographs from the private collection of actress Alene Robertson, radio show memorabilia, record albums, compact discs, the rare "Tomorrow" 45 rpm with the original juke box insert, comics by Harold Gray and Leonard Starr, showcards, Playbills from the various incarnations of Annie, Annie 2, and Annie Warbucks, authentic press packs from the Marriott Lincolnshire and New York City productions of Annie Warbucks, Annie statues, stamps, magazines, books, videos, and other collectibles. The tables were covered in "Annie red" to match Piejko's Annie dress, and the photographs and posters literally covered the wall from ceiling to floor.

Karen Piejko received an A on the thesis. She holds a Bachelor of Arts in Media Communications, an Associate of Arts in Theater, and is a member of the Delta Psi Omega National Theatrical Honors Society. She received the 1995 Kevin Pressley Award for Excellence in the Performing Arts for directing and starring in a revival of Edna St. Vincent Millay's *Aria Da Capo* at the Oremus Theatre. She is a straight A graduate student at Governors State University and will earn her MA in June 1998. Piejko received the nationally acclaimed distinction of All-American Scholar in 1997 and is featured in its national publication. In addition, she was named to the 1995-96 and 1996-97 editions of the National Dean's List and is profiled in its national publications for her outstanding academic achievements and scholarly work in arts and science.

"Annie: A History and Analysis of a Media Creation" was in fulfillment of the thesis/project requirement for the degree of Master of Arts in Communications and Training. The thesis committee consisted of Professor Eli Segal, Professor Walter Perkins, and Professor Ana Kong of the Media Communications/Communication Studies program, a division of the college of arts and science at Governors State University.

Leapin' Lizards! Is it Karen Piejko or Little Orphan Annie?



Piejko put a unique, but typical Piekjo touch, on the presentation of her 500-page (reduced from 600 pages in order to get it in the binder) Master's thesis on the history and evolution of Little Orphan Annie. She accompanied the thesis with 45-minutes of "Annie" song and dance and a narrative which she composed and had fellow graduate student John DeYoung read.

In her usual gung-ho style, Piekjo packed the room with Annie memorabilia, including posters, albums, comics, statues, music and dolls. And she tailored her presentation to the audience, in particular the faculty committee members. Annie's props included Perkins Pickles (in honor of Professor Walter Perkins), Segal Suds (alluding to Professor Eli Segal), Kong's Cookies (baked for Professor Ana Kong) and a bonus of Muchnik Mushrooms for invited guest Professor Mel Muchnik.

While the narrative told the history of Little Orphan Annie and Daddy Warbucks, the song and dance performance entertained and amused the small audience — and hopefully impressed the committee.

Next are two Christmas tree lights painted in very pale tones to let the light shine through. Left: A 14" 1930s composition doll wearing her original dress and hang tag. (Composition is a ground-wood mixture which can be highly glazed and painted.) The 15" Remco "Raggedy Ann" style doll came in a colorful box in 1967, the same year Remco also made this 15-1/2" plastic doll with rooted hair and "googly" eyes. A New Jersey artist made an all-porcelain 10" doll in 1985. Below: This complete set of Rummy Cards showing comic strip scenes from Whitman Publishing came in two different boxes in 1935 and 1937.
